Regulation Workshop and Hearing History

- September 21, 2023
 - Initial workshop with each diploma option heard as a separate regulation
- February 9, 2024 R099-23
 - Initial workshop for regulation with combined diploma option language
- April 15, 2024
 - State Board of Education Hearing with request to make changes to R099-23
- June 12, 2024
 - State Board of Education Hearing with both votes failing

School District Feedback Questions

- Most students who stay at the same school for all 4 years should be able to meet the requirements of R099-23.
- Exceptions
 - Students with a disability that may be taking additional support classes to support their learning.
 - Students who are English language learners that may be taking additional support classes to support their learning.
 - Students with a disability and are English language learners that may be taking additional support classes to support their learning.



Specific Examples

- Student was enrolled in special education courses for four years of high school and took Personal Development, Pre-vocational Skills, Functional Fitness twice, Lifetime Sports and Recreation, and Mythology and Folklore to earn a Standard Diploma.
- Student was enrolled in courses for English Learners and courses for Special Education and took Pre-vocational Skills, Social Living/Independent Living, Functional Fitness, and other elective courses.



School District Feedback

- Students who transfer between districts or from out-of-state may not meet the graduation requirements.
- Examples:
 - Student transferred from California with a math elective and out-of-district elective (Current Events).
 - Student who started in a CTE pathway that is not offered in the district they move into could have problems meeting the flex credit requirements and the fine arts requirement.



School District Feedback

- Arts, Humanities, and Career and Technical Education Offerings
 - A couple of districts that provided feedback thought that it could result in reduced offerings for a variety of reasons.
 - One district indicated that a few schools could have difficulties with staffing to implement the requirement (June 12, 2024).
- Ensure alignment between diploma requirements and college entry requirements.
