Model Code of Ethics for Educators: Giving our Profession Permission to Have the Difficult Conversation

Workshop Description

Professional educators are often not prepared for a nuanced profession that does not have clearly defined roles and has been ascribed expectations that far exceed classroom content delivery. Without a clear understanding of the ethical and regulatory frameworks that should guide professional decision-making, educators and school districts are placed in a position of risk and vulnerability. This interactive workshop will focus on how the how the recently unveiled *Model Code of Ethics for Educators* (MCEE) establishes a framework to better navigate the complexities and competing tensions of the schooling environment. Through case studies, video clips, engaging models of understanding, and lively discussion, we will build a case that in our profession, like in other fiduciary professions, ethics should actually be a higher threshold than law.
