SUBJECT: Fiscal Year 2019 SB 178 Allocation

This memo is intended to provide information on how the Account for the New Nevada Education Funding Plan, to which \$36 million is appropriated for school year 2018-19 will be allocated. The NDE heard from districts that having SB 178 allocation information now rather than July would help support district planning and budget building that takes place each spring. Thus, the NDE, after working with districts on essential data collection to inform allocations, is releasing the 2018-19 school year allocation well in advance of the July statutory deadline.

The 2017-18 allocations were based off of the pre-Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) statewide system of accountability which had not been updated since 2014 and was based on school year 2013-14 data. The 2018-19 allocations will, for the first time use the post-ESSA statewide system of accountability and use new 2016-17 student achievement data to inform allocations. This provides a much more up-to-date reflection of where the need is and fulfils the purpose of SB 178 to have the funds follow the student. The result of this year's allocation from the Account for the New Nevada Education Funding Plan is that 161 schools will be served; up from 136 last year. The total number of students funded by SB 178 in 2018-19 will be 30,000. For a breakdown of funding across schools and districts see Appendix A. *The requirements of SB 178 are as follows:*

By July 1 of each year, the Nevada Department of Education (NDE) is charged with determining the number of pupils in each public school who are English learners or are eligible for a free or reduced lunch who score in the bottom 25th percentile in proficiency, who are not enrolled in a Zoom or Victory school, and who do not have an individualized education plan (IEP).

Sec. 8. (1) On or before July 1 of each year, the Department shall, using the final count of pupils from the previous school year, determine the number of pupils in each public school who: (a) Are English learners or are eligible for a free or reduced price lunch pursuant to 42 U.S.C. §§ 1751 et seq.; (b) Scored at or below the 25th percentile on an assessment of proficiency described in paragraphs (a) to (e), inclusive, of subsection 1 of section 10 of this act or, for a grade level for which such an assessment does not exist or does not provide sufficient information to identify all such pupils, are projected to be at or below the 25th percentile for proficiency by the Department pursuant to subsection 2 of section 10 of this act; (c) Are not enrolled at a Zoom school or Victory school; and (d) Do not have an individualized education program.

The NDE shall provide a per pupil amount of \$1,200 for each pupil identified to each school starting with the lowest rated school until funding is exhausted.

Section 8(2) On or before July 1 of each year, the Department shall determine, beginning with the category of all public schools that received the lowest rating possible indicating underperformance of a public school, as determined by the Department pursuant to the statewide system of accountability for public schools, and proceeding through each category of all public schools that received the immediately higher rating until not all public schools within a category could be funded, each category of public schools for which the Department could provide a per pupil allocation of \$1,200 from the Account for the New Nevada Education Funding Plan created by section 7 of this act for the upcoming school year for each pupil identified in subsection 1 who is enrolled at each public school in the category.

By July 15, NDE shall transfer money to districts and charter sponsors to serve identified students at identified schools.

The Department shall use the following criteria to determine proficiency for 2018-19 school year allocation using student achievement information for the 2016-17 school year:

- English Learners WIDA Assessment
- K-3 Smarter Balanced Extrapolation
- 4th through 9th grade –Smarter Balanced
- 10th grade EOC Math I
- 11th through 12th grade Credit Deficiency

In future allocations NDE will be able to use Measures of Academic Progress in grade K-3 and will no longer need to make to make assumptions based on Smarter Balanced results.

Sec. 10. 1. To determine the proficiency of a pupil pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of section 8 of this act, the Department shall use, for a pupil who is: (a) An English learner in any grade, the assessment of proficiency in the English language prescribed by the State Board pursuant to NRS 390.810. (b) In kindergarten or grade 1 or 2, the "Measures of Academic Progress" published by the Northwest Evaluation Association, if implemented by the Department. (c) In grade 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 or 8, the examinations administered pursuant to NRS 390.105. (d) In grade 9 or 10, the end-of-course examination required pursuant to NRS 390.600 for mathematics. (e) In grade 11 or 12, the college and career readiness assessment administered pursuant to NRS 390.610.

Sec. 10. 2. The Department shall, by regulation, establish a method for projecting the number of pupils who are at or below the 25th percentile for proficiency in any grade level for which an assessment identified in subsection 1 does not exist or does not provide sufficient information to identify all such pupils. Such a method may allow for the number of pupils to be projected by examining: (a) The proficiency of pupils in nearby grade levels if an assessment for a grade level has not been fully implemented; or (b) Information on credit deficiency for any grade in high school for which insufficient information exists to identify all such pupils.

The funding allocations listed in the table below are intended to reach the schools at the dollar amount indicated to service the eligible students.

Section 7 (3) The board of trustees of each school district and the sponsor of each charter school shall establish a special revenue fund and direct that the money the board of trustees or sponsor receives pursuant to section 8 of this act be deposited in the special revenue fund. Money in the special revenue fund must not be commingled with money from other sources. The board of trustees or the sponsor, as applicable, shall disburse money in the special revenue fund to public schools in the school district or sponsored by the sponsor, as applicable, in accordance with section 8 of this act.

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Section 8. The board of trustees of a school district or the sponsor of a charter school that receives money pursuant to this subsection shall distribute the money to each identified public school on a per pupil basis for each pupil identified in subsection 1 who is enrolled at the public school.

The permissible uses of funds from the Account for the New Nevada Education Funding Plan is based on what we know works from the Victory and Zoom programs plus other evidence based interventions, programs, and services. Schools may only use funds for the purposes outlined in Section 9 that are evidence based.

Section 9 (3). A public school that receives money pursuant to section 8 of this act must use the money only on programs or services which are evidence-based, as defined in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(21).

Programs piloted through the Victory and Zoom programs are also permissible and the NDE stands ready to assist districts in identifying high quality, evidence based programs and services.

A minimum of ninety percent of the funds must be spent on the following:

Evidence-based, as defined in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(21)*

*This refers to ESSA evidence levels 1-4: Strong, Moderate, Promising, or Demonstrates a Rationale

- Extended learning opportunities (including, but not limited to):
 - Summer academy
 - o Intersession academy
 - o Before or after school program
 - o Extended school day
 - o Learning opportunity at another time when school is not in session
- Academic interventions (including, but not limited to):
 - o Reading or literacy center
 - o Administration of a common, valid, and reliable formative and summative assessment
- Early childhood education, including a prekindergarten program
- Any other strategy designed by the public school and approved by the Department
- Parent and family engagement programs or services
- School climate and culture programs
- Social, psychological, or health care services to pupils and their families (including, but not limited to):
 - o Counseling
 - Wrap-around services

Evidence-based, as defined in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(21)(A)(i)**

- **This refers to ESSA evidence levels 1-3: Strong, Moderate, or Promising
- Academic interventions:
 - Implementation of curriculum or software, which may include, without limitation, a course of instruction in college and career readiness;
 - o Hiring of personnel to implement an academic intervention

No more than 10% can be spent on the following:

Evidence-based, as defined in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(21)*

*This refers to ESSA evidence levels 1-4: Strong, Moderate, Promising, or Demonstrates a Rationale

- Reimbursement for coursework required to obtain endorsement relating to English language acquisition and development for teachers and other licensed educational personnel serving EL students
- Retention incentives for teachers or other licensed educational personnel serving EL students and have obtained endorsement

Evidence-based, as defined in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(21)(A)(i)**

- **This refers to ESSA evidence levels 1-3: Strong, Moderate, or Promising
 - Professional development

Before using the funds the public school must consult with staff, parents, legal guardians, and school organization team (if one exists) on which permissible uses of funds the school will dedicate the funding towards. Together the public school, staff, parents, legal guardians, and school organization team (if one exists) are to create a plan for the use of the funds and the goals to be achieved as a result of the funding.

Sec. 9. 1. A public school that receives money pursuant to section 8 of this act shall use the money only for the purposes identified in this section. 2. Before using any money received pursuant to section 8 of this act, a public school must: (a) Consult with: (1) The appropriate staff of the school district in which the public school is located to coordinate the use of the money by the public school with the use of money received pursuant to section 8 of this act by other public schools located in the school district in a manner that maximizes the efficient use of such money; and (2) The parents or legal guardians of pupils enrolled at the public school and, if an organizational team exists for the school, the organizational team, to determine the needs of pupils and the preference of the parents and legal guardians and the organizational team, if any, for services provided pursuant to subsections 4 and 5; and (b) In consultation with the parents or legal guardians of pupils enrolled at the public school and the organizational team, if any, develop a plan for the use of such money and the goals to be achieved as a result of the use of such money.

The NDE was required to prescribe annual measurable objectives and performance targets for schools who receive funding to track the performance of pupils to ensure a high return on investment for eligible students.

Sec. 11. 1. The Department shall prescribe annual measurable objectives and performance targets which must be used by a public school that receives money pursuant to section 8 of this act to evaluate and track the performance of pupils who receive services pursuant to section 9 of this act. The annual measurable objectives and performance targets prescribed by the Department must be aligned to the statewide system of accountability for public schools.

The NDE chose to align the annual measurable objectives and performance targets for schools who receive funding to the long term goals and measures of interim progress contained within our ESSA plan. This aligns SB 178 funding with the annual measurable objectives and performance targets for Zoom and Victory Schools.
