Philosophy of Granting: The "ethos" of the work of the NCOM is to create opportunities for subpopulations within Nevada's demographic population that have been historically disenfranchised with regard to family health and wellness, criminal justice, academic capacity, and employment focuses. These categories contain conditions unique to various regions throughout the State of Nevada; however, this work will be centered Washoe County and Clark County. Further, the charge given to the Commission is to support and facilitate mentorship programs in the State of Nevada (NRS 385.760, 385.780).

Who's Eligible?

An individual or organization willing to build and develop capacity to serve Nevada's youth and adults are welcome to apply. Regardless of current capacity to offer mentor services NCOM will off a continuum of technical assistance, trainings and seminars to help organizations move their vision

forward. Therefore, any organization with the willingness to commit to service within the conditions set by NCOM is eligible.

Fiduciary

Working with a grant process based on reimbursements is difficult when the mentor organization does not have the matching funds. Working with a "fiduciary" is one way to demonstrate the matching funds needed to participate with the NCOM grant process. A fiduciary is a person or organization that acts on behalf of another person or organization to manage assets. The fiduciary holds a legal or ethical relationship of trust with the organization being supported.

Letter of Grant Award

Grant recipients will receive an NCOM Grant Award Letter that states the amount the mentor organization has been awarded. In some cases business establishments will vet a grant letter of award and provide services through a purchase order (PO). NCOM is willing to confirm the amounts each mentor organization is able to spend with outside organizations and vendors.

Strategic Granting Description

North - Junior Commission

The Junior Commission is a NCOM facilitated mentor project that involves postsecondary students, high school students, and community stakeholders. The Junior Commission will seek a faculty advisor from one of the local postsecondary institutions. The work of the Junior Commission is to plan, implement, and monitor mentor / mentee activities that align to the NCOM area of focuses (Family Health and Wellbeing, Criminal Justice, and Academic Capacity Building). The Junior Commission will seek to develop "grass roots partnerships" that develop small organizations interested in mentor work using a Cohort model of local organizations. These organizations will collaborate with and take ownership of various mentor activities "seeded" by the NCOM Junior Commission.

The work identified by the Junior Commission (North) is based on the NCOM Process for Identifying Children in need of a Mentorship Program / Justification for Geographic Service."

The Junior Commission will be established as a formal mentor organization with the establishment of an LLC. All mentor organizations receiving a NCOM grant that do not have the capacity to establish as a formal business entity or establish the required matching funds can use the Junior Commission as a fiduciary.

NCOM Facilitated – Clark County \$10,000

Clark County Public School District would be allotted the funds to enable the e-page system to be used to monitor grant activity for the Junior Commission South.
