From the Director's Office by Craig Statucki

I hope everyone is enjoying the slightly warmer of Spring and is excited to finish out the school year. The Office of Career Readiness, Adult Learning, and Education Options (CRALEO) has several updates to share as you prepare to end the school year.

We recently hired three new staff members. Cindi Chang was promoted last fall to the Director of the Office of Teaching and Learning Supports and we hired Anna Reynolds as the new Assistant Director for our team. Anna joined us after working at the State Public Charter School Authority (SPCSA) and has previous experiences in the Clark County School District as an Instructional Design Facilitator and as a Project Facilitator for the Assessment, Accountability, Research, and School Improvement Division.

In the 2023 Legislative Session, the Department was charged with the development of the Teacher Academy College Pathway Program from Assembly Bill 428. We hired Ingrid Cepeda in March as an Education Programs Professional to lead this work. Ingrid is a former administrator from the Clark County School District and has two decades of experience in leading, developing, and implementing programs in K-12 education.

Our most recent hire is Catie Wood who joined our team as an Administrative Assistant II. She is replacing Bill O'Driscoll who retired over the summer. Catie joins us after working with the Department of Taxation for the last four years.

Our new editions to the staff will be great resources for you as educators and are eagerly looking forward to supporting you and your students.

We are thrilled with the turnout that we are seeing at each of the Career and Technical Student Organization's (CTSO) state leadership conferences. The Department is seeing record participation or significant growth in participation from recent years. Thank you for supporting your students in developing and displaying their professional and technical skills in state competitions.

Finally, revisions to the Perkins V State Plan have been completed and the State Plan was approved by the State Board of Education. It is currently being reviewed by Governor Lombardo before our submission to the US Department of Education in May. I appreciate all of the school districts, post-secondary institutions, and communities that invited us to meet with their educators and community partners, tour schools and campuses, and to have open forums with students. Without your support and engagement, the Perkins V State Plan would not reflect the needs of our students, educators, and families. Once approved by the US Department of Education, our office will continue to meet with districts and schools to support the implementation of the State Plan.

I hope you have a fantastic end of the school year and I hope to see you at the Nevada Association for Career and Technical Education Summer Conference in July!

The Nevada FFA Association consists of three zones each made up of a team of students that have worked hard to build their leadership skills and have impacted many students within their zones.



## Nevada FCCLA's Ultimate Journey at the 2024 State Leadership Conference

As Nevada FCCLA members began their Ultimate Journey during the annual State Leadership Conference (SLC) in Reno, they saw a dramatic increase in conference attendees. This year, 528 members, advisers, and chaperones attended from 27 chapters across the state of Nevada and Rancho High School was recognized for having the largest chapter affiliated this year, and Desert Pines High School was recognized for having the largest delegation in attendance for the conference. Nevada FCCLA honored Dena Locke as Adviser of the Year, and both Kara Lee and Michael Gifford as Administrators of the Year, all of whom are from the Academy of Arts, Careers, and Technology. Deseret Blake from West Wendover was honored as the New Adviser of the Year. Many volunteers from the Nevada community participated as judges, timekeepers, and workshop presenters. Nevada FCCLA had the honor of having Nathaniel Tavarez as the keynote speaker, who spoke about his journey to recovery after undergoing a school shooting as an adolescent, as well as the importance of school safety and action planning.

FCCLA has a variety of competitive events that align with the four foundational pathways of: Hospitality and Tourism, Visual Arts and Design, Education and Training, and Human Services. These specialized events allowed members to compete in something that they were passionate about, whether it was something career-specific like Culinary Arts, or a more generalized career readiness area, like Job Interview or Career Investigation. All of our students allowed their FCS pathways to shine in their chosen event. Sixty-five students qualified to represent Nevada at the National Leadership Conference (NLC), which will take place in Seattle, Washington this summer.

Nevada FCCLA has installed a new state officer team for the 2024-2025 school year with seven elected State Officers, as well as a National Officer Candidate that will be running for the National Executive Council during NLC. During SLC, these new officers underwent training for their positions and have begun their term strong with assistance from the 2023-2024 State Officer team.

#### Nevada Association for Career & Technical Education

This year the Association for Career & Technical Education (ACTE) Region V Leadership Conference was held in Honolulu, Hawaii from April 9 - April 12. ACTE is the largest national education association dedicated to the advancement of education that prepares youth and adults for careers. Region V hosts an annual conference to support the professional growth and development of educators in its 17 states and territories: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Guam, Hawaii, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, and our own state, Nevada.

Nevada had 22 educators who were able (and happy) to attend this conference and take advantage of some terrific professional learning opportunities that included industry tours at the Culinary Institute of the Pacific at Kapiolani Community College, Agriculture and Hawaiian Culture at Kakoo Oiwi Farm, the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology, and a variety of others. Breakout sessions were also available on topics like: Empowering Education: Integrating Al as a Dynamic Supplemental Tool for CTE Instruction, Inclusivity in CTE: Providing Dual Benefits to Students by Integrating Dual Language into Your CTE Programs, Cultivating Credential Opportunities for Students with Disabilities, Building Partnerships for Career-Connected High Schools, as well as an Industry Round-Table Discussion to help educators learn how to better support their students.

The Conference was also an opportunity to recognize the outstanding work done by educators in Region V. The Nevada Association for Career & Technical Education (NACTE) was the recipient of three of the five Region V Communication Awards given out every year: Conference Program, Membership Recruitment, and Newsletter (all are available on the NACTE website: nvacte.org). At Northwest Career and Technical Academy the Kindergarten Teaching and Training Program also received a Region V Innovative Program Award. In addition, Nevada educators received two of the eight Excellence in CTE Awards: Lt. Col Scott Caldwell received the Teacher Educator Award and Melissa Scott received the Lifetime Achievement Award. Both of these winners will now move on to the national level and could be named the national award winners at the ACTE Vision Conference this December in San Antonio, Texas. All the recognition that Nevada received demonstrates that the hard work being done in our State to support CTE is not going unnoticed, causing many other states to ask what "your secret sauce" is.

The first Region V Conference was held in Las Vegas, and to celebrate the 50th Anniversary, Nevada will once again host the Region V Conference April 30-May 3, 2025. Besides hosting Region V next year, NACTE also hosts annual conferences for Nevada educators and CTE professionals every July in Lake Tahoe.
